

AORN CHAPTER 1902 MEETING

Guest Speaker – Andy Farris, Zimmer BioMet A New Standard of Care in Rib Fixation

Rib fractures are one of the most common injuries, occurring in approx. 10% of all trauma patients. Several studies show support for the surgical stabilization of rib fractures (SSRF). These studies show that some of the clinical benefits over conservative treatment are: reduced rate of respiratory failure, reduced days of mechanical ventilation, reduced hospital length of stay, reduced rate of tracheostomy, reduced ICU length of stay and reduced rate of pneumonia. A minimally invasive procedure performed intra-thoracically versus extrathoracically and can save up to 90 minutes of surgical time. The Chest Wall Injury Society has agreed upon indications for use and flail chest is the #1 reason for use. Patients do best when performed within 72 hours of diagnosis.

Cellerate RX Surgical

Medical hydrolysate of Type I bovine collagen indicated for the management of surgical wounds, traumatic wounds, partial and full thickness wounds, and first/second degree burns. Currently there have bee no adverse events reported and the only contraindication would be if the patient has a known sensitivity to bovine collagen. The product comes in 1g and 5 g preparation and used in most specialties. The product is sprinkled onto the wound after the fascia is closed and is utilized to aid in the natural wound healing process.
